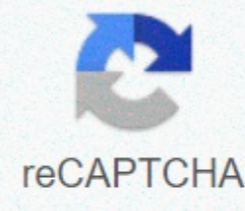




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Poetry tone definition

Consider the tone of The School by Donald Barthelme. Here, words like "death" and "depressing" set a negative or unhappy tone:And the trees all died. They were orange trees. I don't know why they died, they just died. Something wrong with the soil possibly or maybe the stuff we got from the nursery wasn't the best. We complained about it. So we've got thirty kids there, each kid had his or her own little tree to plant and we've got these thirty dead trees. All these kids looking at these little brown sticks, it was depressing.In the following excerpt from Edgar Allen Poe's "The Tell-Tale Heart," notice the many adjectives and verbs that imply insane, nervous, and guilty tones.It was A LOW, DULL, QUICK SOUND -- MUCH SUCH A SOUND AS A WATCH MAKES WHEN ENVELOPED IN COTTON. I gasped for breath, and yet the officers heard it not. I talked more quickly, more vehemently but the noise steadily increased. I arose and argued about trifles, in a high key and with violent gesticulations; but the noise steadily increased. Why WOULD they not be gone? I paced the floor to and fro with heavy strides, as if excited to fury by the observations of the men, but the noise steadily increased. O God! What COULD I do? I foamed -- I raved -- I swore! I swung the chair upon which I had been sitting, and grated it upon the boards, but the noise arose over all and continually increased. It grew louder -- louder -- louder!In A Tale of Two Cities by Charles Dickens, the tone could be said to be mysterious, secretive, ominous, or evil through the use of words like "clammy," "followed," and "unwholesome."There was a steaming mist in all the hollows, and it had roamed in its forlornness up the hill, like an evil spirit, seeking rest and finding none. A clammy and intensely cold mist, it made its slow way through the air in ripples that visibly followed and overspread one another, as the waves of an unwholesome sea might do. It was dense enough to shut out everything from the light of the coach-lamps but these its own workings, and a few yards of road; and the reek of the labouring horses steamed into it, as if they had made it all. This is William Shakespeare at his best. "Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world." In this one line by W.B. Yeats, the words anarchy loosed upon the world create a sense of fear and foreboding. "I shall be telling this with a sighSomewhere ages and ages hence:Two roads diverged in a wood, and I, I took the one less traveled by,And that has made all the difference." This sums up the poem and the effect of tone in general. Robert Frost is commonly interpreted as looking back on his experience with joy. However, in this instance, Frost isn't thrilled with some choice he made in the past. Each of these elements of a story are shades of the same color, but there are differences. We know that when others speak to us, their tone of voice suggests a particular attitude either toward us or the subject that they are discussing. Tone in a poem is no different. The tone of the poem suggests the writer's attitude toward the reader, also known as the audience, or his attitude toward the thing that he is discussing in the poem, also known as his subject. To figure out the tone of a poem, you must feel out the writer's attitude toward the subject or the audience. A poem of praise conveys the tone of approval while a satirical poem conveys an ironical tone. Tone can be formal, informal, playful, angry, serious or humorous, and the tone of a poem can even change throughout the poem. In describing a poem's tone, you may use any kind of adjective you wish as long as it accurately conveys your interpretation of the writer's attitude toward the subject or the audience. Considering Mood and VoiceTo identify a poem's tone, you should also consider two other important and related poetic elements: mood and voice. Tone is closely related to mood and voice, and they will often give you insight into the poem's tone. The mood is synonymous with the atmosphere of the poem, and the emotions and feelings that it evokes in you. The poem's tone, or the writer's attitude toward his subject or audience, helps create a particular kind of atmosphere or mood in the poem. The narrator of the poem is responsible for the poem's voice, conveying the narrator's attitude. In order to properly identify the poem's tone, you should consider the poem as a whole. For example, in the second part of "Dust of Snow," Robert Frost writes, "Has given my heart/ A change of mood/ And saved some part/ Of a day I had rued." The poem as a whole relays a thoughtful moment that is tinged with sorrow. The narrator appears lost in contemplation. In non-fiction, this is the writer/speaker's attitude toward his subject. Tone describes an attitude. Therefore, adjectives are used to describe tone. Some examples of tone words include: withdrawn, amiable, ambivalent, compassionate Tone is detected through diction and style. The reader is responsible for accurately "reading" the tone. The writer is responsible for using a clear tone. Tone may also shift throughout a piece. A writer shifts tone for emphasis. Tone vs. Mood: What is the Difference? What is mood in writing? Mood—also known as atmosphere—is the overall feeling for the audience an author creates in his writing. When you read a text and you have a particular feeling that you associate with the descriptive language, you are experiencing mood. What is tone in writing? Tone is different from mood in that it is the speaker's attitude—not the audience's—toward a subject. How the audience feels has nothing to do with tone. For example, an author may have a straightforward tone but the mood is amusing. Jonathan Swift's satirical essay A Modest Proposal provides this example. The speaker in this piece directly and matter-of-factly presents a solution to the Irish famine. The subject matter, however, is comical (if the audience reads the piece correctly). The Function of Tone What is the purpose of tone? Every piece of writing ever created has tone. Tone is one of the many methods a writer uses to communicate his argument. This is why tone needs to be purposeful and consistent. If one sentence presents an exclamation but the next sentence does not match the tone, the reader will be confused. A writer needs to carefully select his word choice to match his tone throughout his piece. And, if the writer creates a tonal shift, he must be mindful that he is doing so. Even a tonal shift should support the argumentative purpose. Examples of Tone in Literature Tone examples in literature: United States President John F. Kennedy, Jr. presented an Inaugural Address in 1961. In the thick of the Cold War and civil unrest, JFK needed to join his citizens toward one purpose. With that in mind, the President needed to write a speech that matched his intention and vision. Using a unifying and patriotic tone, JFK accomplished just that. This is the origin of the famous line: "And so, my fellow Americans: Ask not what your country can do for you—ask what you can do for your country." JFK's intention was to unite the country (and the world, for that matter) toward a common goal. In order to convince his audience that he was the man to do this, the President's attitude toward his subject needed to match his purpose.
